Jennie is a descendant of Norfolk Island's first commandant, Lieutenant Governor Philip Gidley King and for many years she has been the custodian of an exquisite miniature portrait of King as well as one of his small pearl dress buttons mounted on a gold ring. While visiting the island, Jennie took the opportunity to bring these heirlooms and present them to the Norfolk Island Museum. "I just felt that they belonged here, because of Philip Gidley King's close ties to the island", said Jennie.


Mrs Newland's generous donation was recognised at a reception at Government House, attended by the Acting

Administrator, Owen Walsh, the Norfolk Island Government's Chief Minister, André Nobbs, and the Minister responsible for the Norfolk Island Museum, Vicki Jack, as well as Mr and Mrs Newland and friends, Norfolk Island descendants of King, Eileen and June Richards and Cynthia Deadman, members of the Norfolk Island Museum Trust and Museum staff. Minister Vicki Jack thanked Mrs Newland for her very generous donation and presented her with a Certificate of Appreciation.



The portrait and ring have come to the Museum by direct descent through the King and Robért families. They had been passed down through the King family for several generations until a great great granddaughter of King's married into the Robért family. The Robérts were Huguenots who had escaped religious persecution in France and had established a thriving embroidery business in London.

Then, late in the 19th century Charles Robért was attracted to opportunities in Australia and New Zealand. He established Robért Embroideries in Palmerston North in 1876 and the donor Jennie Newland is a direct descendant of the Robért family.

The miniature portrait was probably painted as a memento to leave with loved ones. It is beautifully made, being painted in oil on ivory and framed in a gold oval frame. The portrait depicts a handsome young man, perhaps in his early twenties, extremely well-dressed in a black morning suit. By this age King was a man of no small achievements. He had been in the Royal Navy since the age of twelve, was midshipman at seventeen, and lieutenant at twenty. At the time of his portrait he was probably serving in the Channel Fleet under the command of Captain Arthur Phillip. These two men had a long and mutually respectful friendship that very much influenced early settlement at Port Jackson and Norfolk Island.

Always keen to learn more about a particular object, I opened up the back of the frame to see what might be hiding there and found a pencil inscription "A. King 1859". It is assumed that this is an inscription of ownership, and with further research "A. King" will be identified. I also found a scrap of backing made from a printed flier advertising a coach service by E. Fidler of Hertford. If I can identify this business it will help me date the frame.

While there is still more to research about the painting, there is no doubt that it is a most significant donation to the Norfolk Island Museum. Some quick research on the internet reveals only four portraits of Philip Gidley King. Two single portraits and a family portrait were executed when he first received his commission as Governor of New South Wales in 1800. He was 42 years of age at this time. One earlier portrait depicts a younger Lieutenant King aged 31 years in Voyage of Governor Phillip to Botany Bay, published in 1789. Now we have a portrait of King in his early twenties, when he was establishing himself in the Royal Navy and preparing himself for the important task of settlement at Port Jackson and Norfolk Island.

## Runway End Safety Area the latest expense for the Airport

"Who would have thought that when we took over the airport from the Commonwealth in 1992 that we would have been lumbered with all the requirements with which we are now forced to comply."

This was the comment of the Minister for Finance, Neville Christian when he answered a series of 'Questions without Notice' at last Wednesday's Assembly meeting about the extension of the airport runway to provide a 'Runway End Safety Area' (RESA).

It was Ian Anderson who posed the first question when he asked the Minister:- "Will the proposed RESA project be going to public tender?"

In his reply, the Minister said that whether the work goes to tender as a whole job lot, or it is broken up into components and expressions of interest sought from local contractors, will be a matter for the Administration at the appropriate time.

Tim Sheridan then posed a number of questions on the RESA and asked:- "In regard to the runway end safety area that has been proposed to be completed, could you advise the community as to why an exemption has not been sought from CASA?"

Neville said that he would endeavour to shed some light on this question and said that he "was quite happy to share any information that he possesses, with any member of the community and Assembly Members."

He said he welcomed any questions and went on to say: "I think the Norfolk Island Government (NIG) was

notified some time in 2002-2003 that RESA would be required for airports providing international services by 3rd May 2008.

"Basically" he said "it boiled down to two optionseither provide the full RESA requirements or apply for a dispensation."

In shedding more light on the 'dispensation' the Minister said "you cannot apply to CASA for a dispensation based on the grounds of cost. You have to actually put up a safety case. When the NIG first became aware of the RESA requirements, the costs that were being bandied about were very significant, they were in the order of \$14 million to \$16 million. When you combine that with the requirement to upgrade the surface pavement with overlay that was recently completed - that being about \$A12 million - it was really beyond what Norfolk could manage.

"At that stage work did progress on putting together a 'safety case'. However, things chop and change within CASA, depending on the staff member you are dealing with. Some say 'yes, put in an application, we think it will be received favourably' others say 'No, based on what we have seen of the topography around Norfolk Island. Even if you did lodge an application we probably would not approve it.""

"I am aware that there are some residents in Norfolk at the moment who are a little bit concerned about RESA. I can shed some light on that as well.

"One of the affected land owners (Derek Greenwood), asked me if it was true that the NIG

intended going ahead with RESA. I told him that the NIG intended going ahead with the full RESA and that was the end of the conversation. What I did not know at the time was that Mr. Greenwood was in possession of a plan prepared in 2004 which showed full RESA actually encompassing his house. I have never seen that document and I can understand, in the absence of me elaborating, why Mr. Greenwood was quite distressed.

"I think we have Mr. Greenwood's concerns under control, because at his end of the runway we will only be projecting what's already there towards his property 30 metres. We do not intend covering his house with soil or re-locating it or compulsorily acquiring it.

"We then had more survey work done and it then became apparent that rather than the half million cubic metres of earth works that was required to provide full RESA, some of it already existed and the most recent indications are that we will only have to move somewhere between 45 - 65,000 cubic metres of earth. That is a vastly smaller amount than that which had previously been bandied about.

"The current NIG began to think that is within the realms of possibility for us to fund and we estimate the earth works at this stage will cost, in round figures, about \$900,000. There will be some additional costs to get consultants to put together the engineering drawings, the surveying drawings and some environmental assessments which are necessary to lodge a development application.

"That is the option - we can apply a full RESA or ask for a dispensation.

The Minister then shed some light on the dispensation option and providing a full RESA option. "We have considered the options very carefully and the NIG has decided that providing full RESA is the only option that actually improves aviation safety in Norfolk Island and reduces the reliance on human judgement.

"If we went down the course of seeking a dispensation, it is fraught with danger. Firstly, there is no guarantee that any dispensation that is applied for will be granted. If granted, there is no guarantee that any dispensation issued will be permanent and we are all aware of changing requirements in the world of aviation in respect of aviation security and the like. Who would have thought that when we took over the airport from the Commonwealth in 1992 that we would have been lumbered with all the requirements with which we are now forced to comply.

"If you have more than one over-run incident, per 10 million landings or take offs you cannot apply for a dispensation. If you already have a dispensation, it is possible that you could actually lose the dispensation and then be forced to put the RESA in. How you provide RESA in a reasonable time frame in that situation while keeping the airport operational, I am not quite sure.

"The core of any dispensation would be a manual, probably written by myself, Glenn Robinson and Peter Davidson advising pilots how to operate their aircraft when landing at Norfolk Island. In short, the manual

would state 'the runway is grooved, well maintained and can be treated as dry in all weather conditions for operational purposes. Upon touch down apply maximum wheel braking effort and maximum reverse thrust and you should stop before the end of the runway. The ridiculous thing in all of this is that if you have no brakes or you have no reverse thrust or some other malfunction, then the 'how to manual' counts for absolutely nought. It would almost certainly result in Derek Greenwood or Mootchie Christian receiving unwelcome visitors!

The Minister was then asked what process would be followed prior to any commencement of work on the RESA extension?

"Members will recall' the Minister said "that during an earlier briefing on the RESA matter, I had suggested to Members that work at the airport would be able to continue without a development application being lodged through our normal planning process because the work was covered by the development control plan for the Airport.

On reading that document in more detail, it became apparent that the development control plan did not in fact cover the work that we were proposing now, as that work would have needed to have been included in an airport upgrade plan prepared by GHD in 2004 and RESA does not form part of that.

"The situation is that a full flow-on development application will be lodged. It will be accompanied by an environmental impact assessment. That environmental impact assessment will be detailed enough to satisfy the requirements of our planning legislation and it will also be detailed enough to satisfy the requirements of the Commonwealth's Environmental Protection and Biodiversity Act.

"The surveyor is arriving on island on Sunday to do the preliminary design work and to put pegs in which would show the extent of the earth works.

"At the Bishop's Court end I expect that to be pretty straight forward. At the Eastern end of the runway (the Mootchie Christian end), it is a bit more complex and this is where we run into difficulties.

"The Chief Minister and I visited the airport and were briefed by airport staff and we have satisfied ourselves where we think the extent of the earth works will be.

"We think, and this will be confirmed by the surveyor, that the extent of the earth works will be approximately, on an extended centre line of the runway, half way across the existing Peter's Highway.

"In the past, where I had suggested to Assembly Members that we may have to purchase two blocks of land from Mootchie Christian, and I have in fact had those properties valued in case we had to do that, we may now only have to negotiate with Mootchie to purchase as little as 5 metres of land from his road frontage. That would allow the earth works to be accomplished without the expensive concrete retaining wall that had previously been spoken about and the relocation of the existing Peter's Highway four or five metres beyond where it currently is now. So we would duplicate everything that is currently there and move it slightly eastward.

Another question as to whether landowners adjoining these areas would be fully compensated if necessary, and advised prior to any work to the RESA extensions, was then asked by Tim Sheridan.

"Absolutely" was the Minister's reply. "The development application will give every member of the Norfolk Island community an opportunity to comment. I will, over the next few weeks, be putting out a series of Press Releases to keep the community informed of the issues.

"I should put people's minds at rest when it comes to the acquisition of property at the eastern end of the runway as well. The landowner there, has agreed to sell us a freehold block of land, or part thereof that is not within KAVHA, if we require it. The large block of land directly at the end of the runway is Crown lease land. Under the Crown Lease Act of 2002, a number of things can happen. If the NIG requires the land for public purposes we can actually acquire it. There are three ways which we can acquire it - at the expiry of the lease, and the lease happens to expire on the 2nd or 3rd of September this year, NIG can notify the

Commonwealth that we require the land for public purposes and not to renew the lease or if the lease is renewed, we can serve three months notice that we require the land for public purposes and proceed as such; or we can notify the Commonwealth that we require a portion of the land for public purposes or we can enter into a commercial arrangements with the landowner and purchase the whole lot or part thereof.

"To clarify the situation I had the property valued with the full agreement of Mootchie Christian, and I have received one valuation. The second valuation is being done by the Queensland Valuer-General when he arrives on the island in the not too distant future and that will enable us to move forward.

"Under the non-renewable clause of the Crown Lease legislation, if we advise the Commonwealth to not renew the lease, we are obliged to pay whatever capital improvements have been made to the property.

"The property that we are looking at at the moment, the improvements include concrete drive ways, a dwelling, a large farm-type implement shed and legend has it 'a gold mine' but the valuer didn't find the gold mine!

"I did in fact notify the Commonwealth that we required the land for public purposes and requested that they not renew the lease. I have since been informed by the Administrator that Federal Minister Jim Lloyd has instructed him to renew the lease. The implication there for the NIG is that if we do proceed to acquire the land, we are now not only required to pay for the improvements that are there, we are in fact required to pay out the rest of the 28-year lease.

"That is why I am keen not to buy the whole lot, but we are negotiating with Mr. Christian to buy a portion of land that we require and indications at the moment are that we are going down that road."

#### Waste Management Centre

#### Madeira Vine – Anredera cordifolia

This weed originating in South America, is not widely distributed on Norfolk. Shown here is the aerial tuber of the plant.



The plant was imported because of its attractive white flowers and strong growth habit. It was often planted beside outdoor toilets in Australia, as the leaves, when eaten, were believed to have a laxative effect. Adapting to a vast range of soils and conditions, Anredera has spread along the waterways and through forests and is now considered to be one of the greatest threats to rainforest remnants.

It is the heaviest of the problem vines and can smash the branches of trees by its sheer weight. The stem can grow one metre per week. Trials of Glysophate CT @10 to 1 through a gas splatter gun, are showing good results in 100 Acres where there is a substantial outbreak of the weed.

#### Headstone area progress





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GST Quarterly Report April: June 2007 Quarter

In accordance with S19 of the Goods and Services Tax Act, 2007 (The Act), as Chief Revenue Officer, I am required to report on the operations of The Act for the April:June 2007 Quarter to the Minister for Finance by 31 July 2007.

Accordingly, I provide the following information:

a) As The Act commenced on 2 April 2007, this report covers receipts for the months of April and May as well as amounts paid by NBN holders for the June period but prior to the June due date in July 2007. Approximately \$60,000 has been claimed in duty draw back. The figures stated below are net of duty draw back.

- on 16 July 2007 for non payment of April 2007 GST. Minor delays were experienced in issuing these penalty notices due to required changes having to be made to the Regulation which occurred at the end of June 2007. Two of these penalty notices were unable to be served. Penalty notices are being issued each month as and when they are due.
- A consultant was engaged in June 2007 to c) prepare GST procedure documents, develop position descriptions for the two staff required to operate the GST office, review the legislation for deficiencies and possible changes and produce checklists documentation for users. This work has been completed in draft and is currently being reviewed by GST staff prior to issue and loading onto the web where appropriate. Legal staff are currently reviewing his critique on the legislation and I am expecting their recommendations as to proposed changes to the legislation. consultant also developed a financial model to be used for the end of year accounts identifying the contingent liability relating to the duty draw back as well as the net present value of the contingent liability.
- d) The GST office is relocating to Burnt Pine and staff have worked with the landlord in relation to the office layout. It is expected that the office will be available for occupation by 6 August 2007. Office furniture will in the main, be provided from within Administration however a counter and reception desk has been ordered locally for approximately \$6,000.
- e) NSL finalisation: During this period, the GST office worked to finalise outstanding matters in

Temporary staff original engaged to undertake the duties of the NSL office have been utilised in the GST Office. In total, \$1,184,336.55 was collected by staff within this unit since the commencement of the NSL and subsequent GST legislation.

It is expected that the Unit will be staff substantively within the first quarter 2008 operations.

#### Are Lighterage launches to be replaced by motorised barges?

This was the question posed by Mr. Tim Sheridan to the Minister for Finance, Neville Christian at Wednesday's Assembly meeting.

The Minister said that he was more than happy to respond and gave the following background to the question.

"Members will recall" he said "that last week we were looking at the Budgets for the Government Business Enterprises (GBEs) and in the Lighterage Budget there is a capital request for \$40,000 to replace the aluminium launch that is currently used.

As part of the entire Budget process, we are considering re-equipping lighterage with more modern aluminium barges. One of the principal purposes for doing that is that current lighters do not satisfy modern occupational health and safety standards. It exposes the workers to unnecessary risks.

Our public liability insurance for the lighterage service has steadily climbed to the stage where it is now approaching \$30,000 for the year. The insurance assessor that we use has stated to the Administration. that the cost of insurance remains as it is because we have a fairly good safety record within lighterage. However, if an incident were to occur, the insurance premium would balloon massively.

We also have a situation where cargo coming to the island is getting larger and more awkward to handle. We have a length limit on goods imported into the island of about 12 metres. Routinely now, that is being breached and we can only carry it when we lash two lighters together and the cargo overhangs either end of the lighter. It is a situation where we are basically outgrowing the lighters.

What I have done is to seek some quotes from manufacturers in New Zealand on providing barges. I don't have those quotes as yet, but when we do we will continue our deliberations.

Basically, what I have asked the manufacturers to do is to design something that has a flat cargo area 14 metres long and 3 metres wide. That is more or less the same width of an existing lighter but able to comfortably take the 12 metre length limit that we have imposed at the moment, in the confines of the barge so that it doesn't have to over hang.

I have also asked them to design into the cargo area safe havens for the deckhands so that they have somewhere to protect themselves from falling cargo. I have also asked that the helmsman be protected with some form of enclosed structure. I have also requested that the barges be powered by 4-stroke outboard motors. That would allow the Administration to provide, or hold in stock a couple of spare outboards in case of emergencies.

If we look at Lighterage as a whole, one of the catalysts for all this is that lighterage workers some weeks ago requested a small pay adjustment that would bring them into parity with the stevedores who work the ship.

I requested the public service to run some numbers for me to see what the impact on lighterage charges would be. The impact, to bring the lighterage workers up to parity with the stevedores, is that lighterage charges would have to rise by - I think in round figures - to 90 cents to a dollar per cubic metre.

You would think that's not a bad thing considering that we haven't reviewed our lighterage charges or our pay rates since 2001. However, if you look at the Lighterage GBE budget to date, it has a cash 'nest egg' of about \$140,000 from memory. Because our last rate increase was in 2001, and our costs have risen substantially in the intervening period, if we do not adjust our lighterage rates now, that \$140,000 'nest egg' will disappear at about the rate of \$50,000 a

I thought it would be appropriate at this time that we re-think what we are doing with lighterage. It is clearly a GBE at the moment that is run on a shoe string. It is clearly a GBE at the moment that does not provide any depreciation. If we are to move into new equipment for lighterage, and I expect that could be as much as \$600,000 to re-equip it with modern equipment, and that is not with the crane, we need to do so fairly quickly before we gobble up that \$140,000 cash 'nest egg'. If we gobble that up and then decide to do something, obviously any increase costs for the use of the lighterage service would be greater.

I do not have a number of what the projected increase would be, but I would suggest that we would also rationalise our lighterage charges. If you look at it at the moment, we have penalties. If you import timber and it is a bundle of such and such a length you pay such and such a charge. If it's a bit bigger you pay a bit more.

I would like to see us go to a flat rate per cubic metre or per tonne irrespective of what the cargo is.

In short these are the things we are talking about and I expect that come next Tuesday, the Assembly members will continue their deliberations.

#### **Turtle Survey**

Turtles have been on the earth for more than 200 million years. They evolved before mammals, birds, crocodiles, snakes, and even lizards. There are 150 different kinds of turtles and seven of them are sea turtles.

All of them are endangered.

We believe the most common species here on Norfolk Island are the green sea turtle. Green sea turtles grows to a maximum size of about 4 feet and a weight of 200 kg. It has a heart-shaped shell, small head, and single-clawed flippers. Colour is variable. Adult heads are light brown with yellow markings. Identifying characteristics include four pairs of costal scutes, none of which borders the nuchal scute, and only one pair of prefrontal scales between the eyes. Hatchling green turtles eat a variety of plants and animals, but adults feed almost exclusively on seagrasses and marine algae.

The current global status of the Green sea turtle population is as follows, breeding colony populations in Florida and on the Pacific Coast of Mexico are listed as Endangered. Australia has many Green sea turtle nesting and foraging sites and is considered to have the largest remaining populations in the world. All other sites worldwide are listed as "Threatened".

A major factor contributing to the green turtle's decline worldwide is commercial harvest for eggs and meat. While Fibropapillomatosis, a disease of sea turtles characterized by the development of multiple tumors on the skin and internal organs, has seriously impacted green turtle populations in Florida, Hawaii, and other parts of the world. The tumors interfere with swimming, eating, breathing, vision, and reproduction, and turtles with heavy tumor burdens become severely debilitated and die. Other threats include loss or degradation of nesting habitat from coastal development and beach armouring; disorientation of hatchlings by beachfront lighting; excessive nest predation by native and nonnative predators; degradation of foraging habitat; marine pollution and debris; watercraft strikes; and incidental take from channel dredging and commercial fishing operations.

Norfolk is very lucky to be home to a small population of these wonderful creatures most Norfolk Islanders could tell you that much. However what we could not tell you is where they came from, do they breed here or do they breed elsewhere? What are they eating around the Island and where do they find these food sources? Are they seasonal visitors here or are they residents? How old are they? How big or small are they? Have they always been here? How many are here? What is the difference between the big and the small ones?

Many of these questions could be reasonably accurately guessed at, but realistically no studies have ever been undertaken on Norfolk to accurately answer any of these questions. But thanks to Dr Kellie Pendoley, a marine biologist with too many letters after her name to remember, and local wildlife expert Margaret Christian, that is all about to change.

Dr Kellie Pendoley is a marine biologist currently working in Western Australia who specialises in *(continued overleaf)*

turtles. Kellie is also the daughter of local John Lorking. Margaret Christian's decades of experience in the National Parks and Wildlife office together with her passion and drive for the native flora and fauna have made her known locally as an expert on almost all things wildlife, land, air and sea. For several years these two women have been quietly collecting sea turtle data for Norfolk Island.

Margaret began the project as a small scale study collating sightings of turtles by local tour operators and cliff top residents. Reconnecting with Kellie while home visiting John several years ago provided the technical knowledge and impetus to expand the program, producing a fruitful collaboration.. Results have been very interesting so far, the women have been able to prove almost beyond a doubt that turtles do not breed here on Norfolk Island. This is a fact that many locals would possibly dispute. But as with many answers, these results have turned up more questions. If they aren't nesting here, then why are these turtles living at Norfolk and where did they come from.

Just this week Kellie, with the help of Margaret and Bounty Divers, has submitted an application for Commonwealth funding to begin a 2 year survey specific to Norfolk Island and its sea turtle population. The aim of the project is to accurately document facts regarding turtle sizes, species, habitats and feeding around the island. This will be the first formal scientific turtle survey that has ever been undertaken on Norfolk Island. What an amazing feat from two very motivated and passionate women. We wish them the very best of luck for their project. The results really have the potential to be amazing.

Quarantine policy advisory group proposed

The Minister for the Environment, Education and Social Welfare, the Hon Stephanie Jack MLA, is seeking comment from the community on her proposal to establish a committee to advise on changes to quarantine policies and procedures.

"In establishing such an advisory group, I am seeking input from community members on how to move forward with a progressive quarantine system which will encourage the expansion of our horticultural industries while at the same time ensuring that we minimise all risks", Mrs Jack said. "While I envisage that the committee will have an advisory role, it will have a close involvement with the Administration's professional quarantine staff to ensure that its discussions are well informed and realistic".

Mrs Jack said that other jurisdictions have advisory groups on quarantine to allow community members and industry representatives to have a role in framing quarantine policy. She said that she believed that Norfolk Island had significant horticultural potential and with the appropriate safeguards ornamental and production horticulture could benefit from infusion of new varieties and species. While the same applied to other potential areas of primary industry, Mrs Jack said that her initial intent was to focus on production horticulture.

An advisory committee could provide a means by which people could bring forward innovation in horticulture, while at the same time addressing and managing the risks associated with such innovations. The advisory group could also consider first hand the information provided by Australian Quarantine Inspection Service and NZ Biosecurity on a wide range of quarantine matters. This could build community capacity to address quarantine matters in an informed way and provide support role for both the minister and officers involved in the area

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

#### Update on Regional Partnerships Program Destination Norfolk Island

Thank you again to all those who have contributed to the Regional Partnerships Program. The purpose of this article is to bring you up to date on the progress of the project.

To recap, Norfolk Island Tourism applied for a grant under the Australian Federal Government's Regional Partnerships Program to undertake a substantial destination marketing campaign to increase tourism numbers to Norfolk Island. A grant of \$300,000 was approved on the basis that it be supplemented by a \$100,000 contribution from the Norfolk Island Government plus a further contribution of \$100,000 from the local business community.

We are still endeavouring to reach our \$100,000 target and to date we have cash and pledges from the local business community to the value of \$82,000.

The Commonwealth Government is satisfied that we have our co-funding in place and have now signed a funding agreement which allows us to proceed with the advertising campaign. The advertising campaign consists of two elements, Regional TV and metropolitan and national newspapers.

The Regional TV campaign commences on September 2 and will run for 6 weeks covering an area from Rockhampton in the north right through to central Victoria in the south. The ads will run during prime-time shows to give us the greatest exposure. The metropolitan and national newspaper campaign will dovetail into the TV campaign with ads running in the "Good Weekend" lift-outs in the Sydney Morning Herald, Courier Mail, and The Age. Further print ads will be placed in high readership magazines such as the NRMA Open Road and the RACV magazine.

Copies of the advertising schedules have been forwarded to all of our wholesalers who market in Australia as several of them have indicated they will advertise travel offers alongside our ads. Norfolk Air will also run ads alongside some of our ad placements with special offers for travel to Norfolk Island.

## Norfolk Island murderer 'wants to appeal'

10:10AM Monday August 20, 2007 nzherald.co.nz Glenn McNeill, the New Zealander convicted of murdering Australian Janelle Patton, wants to appeal his conviction on the grounds that his confession to police should not have been played to the jury, it was reported today.

McNeill, who was jailed in Australia for Norfolk Island's first murder in 150 years, was seeking permission to challenge his conviction, Sydney's Daily Telegraph newspaper said.

It said lawyers for McNeill, who was living in Nelson at the time of his arrest, had lodged a draft notice of appeal with Australia's Federal Court against his conviction for Ms Patton's 2002 murder.

A jury found McNeill guilty in March of murdering the 29-year-old - who vanished while on a morning walk -.

Ms Patton suffered more than 60 injuries before her body was dumped in a picturesque island reserve.

When McNeill, 29, was last month jailed for up to 24 years, his lawyers signalled that the former chef would challenge the jury's verdict.

But the Telegraph reported they missed the deadline to file his notice of appeal and now need to seek leave from the Federal Court before the appeal could proceed.

Ms Patton's mother, Carol, told the paper she was disappointed that the case was not yet over.

"While we felt we had that closure, it's now opened up a gain and it's yet another ordeal that we as a family have to go through," she said.

It can take between 10 and 15 working days for a new Australian passport to be issued.


For this reason, we recommend that residents ensure that their passports are up-to-date well before any planned travel off-island.

#### A Page from the Past The Norfolk Island News Edition Friday, 25th August 1950

...An unsung hero of Norfolk Island is the driver of the Works and Housing grader. This man carries on his work quietly and efficiently and above all his road etiquette is unsurpassed. In most cases a driver of such a large vehicle would take advantage of its size. The present driver considers other users of the road before himself. Even if it is inconvenient he will go to endless pains to enable anyone to pass with the shortest possible delay.

....Latest reports to hand state that Mr. Herbert Nobbs' eye condition is progressing most satisfactorily. He is now our of hospital but is still receiving regular treatment. The accident has necessitated that he wear glasses.

....Our reporter certainly walked into a hornet's nest at the Norfolk Island Public Hospital last Tuesday. It appeared that authority had been given for the hospital to be moved to the new premises this Sunday. At a Board meeting held in Kingston on that day it was discovered that the new building is far from ready for occupation. At the time of the arrival of our representative the staff had just received the news that the move was postponed.

One member said she was definitely leaving at the end of the month. Another said that if the move was not affected within the next week she would also be leaving. A third member said she would follow the Matron's lead. Unfortunately Tuesday was Matron Beveridge's day off and at the time she had not heard the news. According to previous interviews it is assumed she will not take the news very willingly.

The entire staff are unanimous in their view - they consider that the present site is not only unsatisfactory for the patients and in many instances does not follow hospital requirements but the conditions for the staff would not be found anywhere else.

Some members bitterly complain that they cannot do two people's work indefinitely.

It appears that unless some drastic move can be effected immediately Norfolk Island will have a hospital but no staff.

....A late "personal" just received says that Master Norman LeCren celebrated his birthday recently.

....The Secretary of the N.I. Branch of the Country Womens Association, Mrs. V. Bright, reports that the C.W.A. social afternoons, which were held twice monthly, have had to be cancelled due to lack of support and interest of the members. Mrs. Bright also reports that preparations for the new baby clinic are now completed but the Association is unable to carry on at the present time, as a trained nurse holding the necessary certificates is not available.

....The strike of the forty Works and Housing employees is now over. Some returned to work last Monday and the rest will return after the present ship that is in port departs. The terms as laid down by the Public Service have been accepted.

..."From You to the Editor" - About six months age the M.V. Holmburn called at Norfolk Island. Last week she made another trio[. She was so long in coming that every establishment here had every opportunity to order goods - this they did - yet when the voyage was finally made she omitted to call at Auckland.

Many were the orate and caustic comments when this news was made public. On the surface they appear to be justly annoyed - the ship is here and their goods still in New Zealand.

Aren't we ever going to get a satisfactory shipping service? "I se haddit".

#### Norfolk Newsletter - August 1973

Historic Notes: Public Seal dates back to 1856:-In 1844 Norfolk Island, which from its settlement in 1788 had been administered by the Government of the Colony of New South Wales, was annexed to the Colony of Van Diemen's Land. Another constitutional change was made in the 1850s, when the Norfolk Island penal station was closed and the Pitcairn Islanders, who had outgrown the resources of their homeland, were transferred to Norfolk Island.

By an Act of the British Parliament passed in July 1855, followed by an order-in-council made on 24th June 1856, Norfolk Island was severed from Van Diemen's Land and created 'a distinct and separate Settlement'. The order-in-council provided that the island be administered by its own Governor, and the Governor of New South Wales for the time being was appointed Governor of Norfolk Island.

The order-in-council also contained a specific reference to the public seal of Norfolk Island, which was to be kept and used by the Governor, and this seal was made by Benjamin Wyon, the 'Engraver of the Royal Seal of England', and forwarded to the Island's first Governor, Sir William Denison.

The text of the Royal Warrant dated 5th December 1856 granting the seal to Norfolk Island, taken from an original document in the Dixson Library, and quoted by permission of the trustees, reads:

'Victoria R,

To Our trusty and Wellbeloved the Governor of Our Island called Norfolk Island Greeting.

With this you will receive a Seal prepared by Our Order for the use of Our Island called Norfolk Island. Our Will and Warrant authorizing the use of the Public Seal for the Colony of Norfolk Island. Our pleasure is, and We doe hereby authorize and direct, that the Said Seal be used in Sealing all public Instruments which shall be made and passed in Our name and for Our Service, in Our said Island. And so We bid you farewell. Given at Our Court at Osborne House, Isle of Wight, this Fifth Day of December in the Twentieth year of Our Reign.

#### **National Park News And Views**

#### *NINPAC*

This week the Norfolk Island National Park Advisory Committee held it's 45<sup>th</sup> half yearly formal meeting.

Members discussed the forthcoming Park works including Kerbing and Sealing Duncombe Bay Road, construction of toilet facilities at Palm Glen, and the construction of a new shadecloth at the Forestry Depot.

The Committee were advised that Mr Ross Hogan has been selected to as the Supervising Engineer for the Duncombe Bay Road works. Mr Hogan was supervising engineer for the previous drainage and reshaping component of the road upgrade and is familiar with Norfolk conditions.

Phase 1 of this final Kerb and Seal stage of the Duncombe Bay Road upgrade will entail preparation of documents, tendering, and contractor selection and is scheduled to commence on 03 September 2007. The second phase, concrete kerbing and bitumen seal, is scheduled to occur between 15 October and 07 December 2007. The third phase is final reporting and sign off.

The road will need to be closed during portions of the work, and once the Supervising Engineer has drawn up a proposed schedule of work, the community will be notified of the closure schedule. All Tourist Operators with Commercial Permits will be notified by letter as soon as the schedule is drafted.

The Palm Glen toilet facilities will be constructed by Crosscut Constructions under their existing tendered schedule of rates. Apart from fencing off the work area, it is unlikely that normal access to Palm Glen will be affected.

The shadecloth at the Forestry Nursery will be paid for by Parks Australia and set in place by Norfolk Administration workers in a continuation of the healthy working partnership between Parks Australia and Norfolk Forestry.

Discussions regarding the Norfolk invasion by Asian House Geckos included mention of the danger of the geckos being carried out to Phillip Island, and the need to eradicate them from Norfolk Island before they become established. The Committee was informed that discussions with Norfolk Administration had already commenced based upon information provided in the recent Whitaker report.

The Meeting also discussed the dangers of accidental spreading phellinus noxious root rot disease by machinery, and especially by chippers where diseased wood may be present.

Other items for discussion included the new Plan of Management, the Green Parrot Aviary, and Occupational Health and Safety.

The next formal meeting of the Committee is scheduled for March 2008.

## Australia keen on ties, but not at China's cost

NEW DELHI, 21st August 2007 Australia might not be in favour of a quadrilateral security dialogue with India, US and Japan in the Asia-Pacific region to avoid antagonising prickly China, but it certainly wants to boost bilateral military co-operation with India.

Close on the heels of Australian defence minister Brendan Nelson's visit to India last month for talks on sharing counter-terrorism, maritime security and other "classified" information, his Navy chief is now in town to take the bilateral defence agenda forward.

With both India and Australia agreeing that there is "a confluence of interests" between them, especially in the Indian Ocean Region (IOR), Vice-Admiral Russell Edward Shalders, RAN, held talks with Navy chief Admiral Sureesh Mehta, Army chief General J. J. Singh, Indian Airforce chief Air Chief Marshal F. H. Major and defence secretary Vijay Singh on Monday. The Australian navy chief will be visiting both the

The Australian navy chief will be visiting both the Eastern Naval Command at Visakhapatnam and the Western Naval Command at Mumbai over the next few days for a first-hand look at India's growing maritime prowess.

Two Australian warships, frigate HMAS *Adelaide* and tanker HMAS *Sirius* will be taking part in the fivenation "Malabar" exercise slated between September 4th-9th in the Bay of Bengal.

Though the huge exercise will mainly revolve around Indian and US warships, it will also include participation from Japan and Singapore, apart from Australia. While Indian warships have exercised with the other countries before, including the trilateral exercise with US and Japan off Yokosuka near Tokyo Bay in April, this will be the first such intensive combat manoeuvres with Australian warships.

This is an indicator that Australia is finally shedding its long-standing suspicion of India's growing naval role in the Indian Ocean region.

"Apart from joint exercises, the two nations are now talking about co-operation in ship designing and construction. They are also exchanging notes on capacity building of smaller nations in their respective regions," said an official.

"The bilateral Maritime Security Operations Working Group and the defence sub-group will also meet soon," he added.

Having established a broad relationship with China in recent years, Canberra naturally does not want to upset Beijing, which has already opposed the emerging quadrilateral "axis of democracy" in the Asia-Pacific region. Be that as it may, new Chinese capabilities like its anti-satellite weapon test on January 11th have been dubbed "disruptive" in Australia's new defence strategy blueprint. India, in turn, finds favourable mention.

## The Guts of It What's hot in health

Sleep- Who needs it?

One thing is certain when you become a parent, life will never be the same again. On the top of the list of things that change for many parents is not being able to sleep when you choose to.

When pregnant with your first child, your expectation may be confined to having to night feed for the first six weeks or so. After this, babies are supposed to 'sleep through' the night and you can then get back to your 'normal' sleep routine.

The reality can be far from this. As many of us have experienced, babies can feed during the night for anything from six weeks to 18 months, or longer. Even when you get past the night feeding stage, babies can wake for many other different reasons, from teething to illness to insecurity. Some babies just don't seem to need as much sleep as others. Some sleep lightly and find it difficult to return to sleep once woken.

Toddlers and older children can also continue to wake regularly. A small child who has had a nightmare or wets their bed is unlikely to be able to settle themselves back to sleep easily. And then there are the parents who have had to drag themselves off the couch or out of bed to go and pick up their 16-year-old from a friend's party at midnight?

Accepting that parenting involves a fair few nighttime duties can help. You may soon, in fact, be able to boast you did get eight hours sleep last night, even if it was broken and over 12 hours.

Many mums give up some of their evening adult time and go to bed earlier than they did before children. It can be tempting to start all sorts of chores and activities once the children are asleep. At last some time to get a few things done! However, going to bed an hour or two earlier might pay off more the next day.

Equally, it can pay to take it easy when you are sleep deprived. Trying not to pack too much into each day means you will be less exhausted and perhaps more able to cope with your fatigue. Daytime naps can make a big difference. The trouble is many of us just can't seem to get around to having them! It can take quite a bit of discipline to leave that pile of washing or those phone calls and sleep while our baby sleeps, and having a toddler as well can sometimes make it impossible. Consider, however, how hard it is to parent when you are really tired. It is more important you are rested, rather than the house being sparkling clean.

Of course, this all works remarkably well when you have only one child! If you do have a toddler or preschooler, you may be lucky enough to get two children down at the same time in the same afternoon. Three might be stretching it. If this miracle does occur remember to set your alarm so you make it to school pick-up on time!

The other solution is to allow a video or TV time in the afternoon when your baby is likely to be asleep. You may be able to snooze on the couch while your older child(ren) is engrossed. Some mums have had success taking toddlers into bed with them and snoozing together for an hour or so. A nice back rub of the little one or some soft music can sometimes do the trick.

How about enlisting the help of your partner, another relative or friend to babysit for a couple of hours on the weekend so you can nap? Your partner may also be happy to do some of the night duties, especially with older children.

Many mums describe how they simply get used to feeling tired. Our bodies seem to adjust over time to having less sleep. However, sleep studies have found that having a large 'sleep deficit' can have the same effect as being drunk or drugged (and here we were spending all that money on chardonnay). Our responses are slower; our memories are worse and most definitely our tempers are shorter. Fatigue can be especially dangerous when driving.

The main thing with trying to get more sleep is to do what fits in with your family. There are no hard and fast rules on who needs to sleep where and when.

In the past, with larger families, children had a lot of human contact. Nowadays, many of our children are expected to sleep alone in their own rooms, sometimes at the other end of the house to their parents. There are some children who sleep easily and well in their own rooms, undoubtedly. But there are many more who emotionally or physically need the presence of parents or siblings nearby to be able to abandon themselves to sleep. A great compromise many parents have come to is to have a mattress or camp bed in their room for young night callers. Children may be happy to sleep there and be close to you, without having to actually come into your bed.

Many babies and mothers sleep better when sleeping together. Keeping your baby close to you can also help you get to know your baby and to understand his or her needs. This may mean having your baby in bed with you, or in a cot or bassinette nearby. Your baby can feed whenever he wants to without disturbing you too much, so that you will get more rest. Being close to you may also calm unsettled babies.

There are some important safety factors you need to consider if you are going to sleep with your baby. For instance, you should never sleep next to a baby if you are a smoker, are intoxicated, are using sedatory drugs, or have any illness or condition that would make it difficult to respond to your baby. It is also important that your baby does not get too hot or goes under the covers or into the pillow. Make sure also that your baby cannot fall out of bed or get stuck between the mattress and the adjoining wall or furniture.

Most mothers who are breastfeeding automatically sleep facing their baby with their body in a position that stops the baby from going under the covers or into the pillow. When not actually feeding, babies should be put on their backs to sleep.

#### SPOTS!

There are several benign skin lesions that appear on many people that can often look like skin cancers. These are the growths that many people consult their doctors as they can mimic the appearance of all types of skin cancers. Fortunately, these benign lesions are more common than skin cancers.

A very common growth is called a 'seborric keratosis' and is related to age as they tend to appear after 30 years of age. They tend to be rough and can range being flesh coloured to black. These skin growths tend to cause itching or irritation and can grow very quickly. Many people have multiple lesions and some people refer to these as 'age spots' or 'barnacles'. If peeled off, they tend to grow back and this frustrates many people. Fortunately, these are completely benign and have no cancerous potential.

However, they mimic **melanoma** in that they can change size, colour, and shape quickly and at times being confused as being a mole. Although can be removed for cosmetic purposes. But remember, any growing lesion should be seen by your doctor even if suspect it is just a seborric keratosis.

Another common growth that closely resembles melanoma are 'solar lentigoes' also called sun spots or liver spots. These flat, brown growths appear most commonly on hands, arms, shoulders, and face as these areas receive sunlight on a daily basis. They are similar to freckles, but these don't disappear when out of the sun.

Like seborrheic keratosis, a lentigo is benign despite the fact that it can resemble melanoma in shape, size and colour. Again, any new or changing mole or pigmented area of the skin should be seen by your doctor.

The face is the most common site for **basal cell carcinoma** and often this is diagnosed as cancer on the nose.

A **fibrous papule** is a small benign growth that tends to appear on or around the nose. It tends to be a flesh-coloured bump that can look like a pimple or the 'pearly' appearance of basal call carcinoma. A fibrous papule grows to several millimetres in area of the face that is often exposed to the sun.

While benign growths far outnumber cancerous growths, any new or changing lesion should be seen by your doctor.

## Police News CRIME

During the week, offenders have entered a shed on private property and removed a Gallagher brand, electric fence unit valued at \$500. As the shed and missing unit could not be seen from the road the owner thinks it may have been borrowed and is hopeful that it will be returned ASAP.

In recent weeks, Police have received a number of enquiries into Family Court matters. Whilst we are happy to offer advice we recommend that if you have marital problems and/or are being threatened and fear for your safety and the safety of children we strongly urge that you seek assistance from a family Court Counsellor and take out a restraining order. The orders can be applied for at the Court registry, assistance is provided and the matter will be set down to be heard by the Court. Both parties have the opportunity to give their version of events and the Court will make a decision based on the evidence presented.

#### TRAFFÎC

Police have observed a marked increase in anti-social driving behaviour lately, we caution motorists that we will not tolerate this behaviour and that the penalties can be severe. We also remind drivers that Police can impound vehicles for numerous offences and you may be without your car for 7 days if apprehended.

It has been brought to my attention that some motorists have complained to the OIC of St. Johns Ambulance in relation to the ambulance speeding whilst on emergency calls. As an emergency vehicle the ambulance is often required to attend at situations quickly and even seconds can make the difference in life and death situations. The drivers are obliged to drive safely, but can exceed the speed limit if required. Section 28 (3) of the Norfolk Island Road Traffic Act gives the driver of an ambulance, fire engine or police vehicle this right.

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Anjali Mudra

Anjali means offering and this Mudra is often accompanied by the word "namaste."

If you have attended even one Yoga class this is a familiar gesture, the bringing together of ones palms at the heart. Your teacher may bring her hands together while saying "Namaste" at the beginning or the end of the class. You will also find this gesture within certain asanas, in Tadasana (Mountain Pose), before you begin Sun Salutations, or in balance poses such as Vrksasana (Tree Pose). This sacred hand position, called anjali mudra (AHN-jah-lee-MOO-dra) is found throughout Asia and the East, from the smiling face of the Dalai Lama peering over his finger tips to images of devotees before a Hindu or Buddhist alter.

In Sanskrit, Mudra means seal or sign and refers not only to sacred hand gestures but also whole body positions. Anjali Mudra is but one of thousands of types of Mudras that are used in Yoga. This Salutation is at the essence of the yogic practise of seeing the Divine within all of creation. Anjali Mudra is used as a posture of composure, of returning to ones heart, whether you are greeting some one or saying goodbye. As you bring your hands together at your centre, you are literally connecting the right and left hemispheres of your brain.

Look for other times to use Anjali Mudra in your practise and life. Besides the beginning and the end or your Yoga sessions, Anjali Mudra can be used within the Sun Salutation and many other asanas as a way to come back to and maintain your centre. When your hands come together over head in Virabhadrasana 1 (Warrior 1) or in tree pose, this is still Anjali Mudra. Connecting this upward movement of your hands through an invisible line of energy to your heart will help your posture and your inner attitude.

In daily life, this prayerful gesture can be used in many ways, when saying grace before meals and meeting and greeting friends. Anjali Mudra is an age old means of helping human beings remember the gift of life and to use it wisely .

Friends of Yoga meet twice weekly at The Yoga Studio above the Cyber Centre in the Village, Tuesday and Thursdays at 5.30 p.m. to 7.00 p.m.Beginners and visitors are very welcome all equipment is available in the studio a small charge applies.

Readers will remember that our Mascot was Miamiti, the endangered Boobook owl and Mana, the Samoan mascot belongs to an endangered indigenous species of tooth billed pigeon (Didunculus strigostris Peale) locally known as the Manumea. The bird is thought to be related to the South American Dodo. When he is not at work promoting the games, Mana can

be found living inland in the undisturbed forests of Samoa.



Standing proud with his shining green coat and chestnut wings, Mana the Manumea enjoys playing a vital role in spreading the games messages of goodwill and peace, particularly to the children of Samoa and the Pacific.

By the time you read this article, the Norfolk Island team will well and truly be settled into the life of Samoa and apart from training, will be preparing for the Opening Ceremony which will take place at Apia Park National Stadium at 6.00 p.m. on Saturday, 25th December (Sunday 26th here on Norfolk).

While opening ceremony preparations have been kept under wraps in order not to spoil the surprise for the viewers and public spectators, the executive producer Walter Francis is aiming to provide a ceremony that is like no other the South Pacific Games has seen in the past. Mana the Mascot - Lives the Dream! - continued set at Olympic Games standard. In order to deliver the goal, Walter and his team researched every opening ceremony of the past Olympic Games since the Los Angeles Games in 1984.

"It will not only be a visual feast but a delight to the ears with intermingled aspects of Samoan culture, dance and music. We are focusing on one central legend with core figures in the ceremony and we also have some pretty amazing props. So I think that in terms of the theatrical aspect of the ceremony we intend it to be world class."

Samoans according to archaeological and linguistic evidence are believed to have migrated from the West, (the East Indies, the Malay Peninsula, the Philippines even to the south of China). The oldest known site of human occupation in Samoa is Mulifanua on Upolo dating back to about 1,000 BC (about 3,000 years ago). This is according to the Lapita pottery that was found there in the 1970s however, there are still recent evidences that Samoa could have been populated much earlier than that.

By far the most important agents of change in Samoan history were the Western missionaries. The missionary influence on Samoan life was so strong they are now devoutly religious people with much time devoted to church activities. After the outbreak of World War I, New Zealand took administrational control of Samoa from 1914 up to the day of independence in January 1962

In a message from Fonoti Monogiamanu Ioane Etuale, Chief Executive Officer of the 2007 South Pacific Games Authority he says - "Talofa, ......thank you to all athletes and officials from the 22 countries participating - American Samoa, Cook Islands, Fiji, Federated States of Micronesia, Guam, Kiribati, Marshall Islands, Nauru, New Caledonia, Niue, Norfolk Island, Northern Marianas, Palau, Papua New Guinea, Samoa, Solomon Islands, Tahiti, Tokelau, Tonga, Tuvalu, Vanuatu and Wallis and Futuna - thank you for your sacrifice and determination to to see everything through. As the Bible teaches us, nothing in this world is easy. But through adversity, success always tastes just that much sweeter. Live the Dream and God bless."

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
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
