



- continued from front page Three community elected Norfolk Island representatives will join three Australian Government representatives to form the Norfolk Island Governance Committee (NIGC).

The role of the NIGC is to provide decisions, advice and recommendations on the governance of Norfolk Island.

- The NIGC's considerations will include the legislative framework and laws applying to Norfolk Island, the delivery of government services, and other governance-related matters of importance to the Norfolk Island community.
- The NIGC will work with the Norfolk Island community to deliver a plan, methodology and timeline to modernise Norfolk Island's governance, consistent with the needs and aspirations of its people, and establish:
 - a new governing body with the appropriate legislative authority and financial and administrative capacity to efficiently, effectively and sustainably administer its responsibilities, and
 - a new governance model that is clear, fair and effective, and ensures a secure and genuinely democratic future for Norfolk Island and all of its people.
- The NIGC will oversee and assist Norfolk Island's transition to the new governance model, and facilitate continued collaboration, cooperation and communication between Norfolk Island's new governing body, the Australian Government, and any service-delivery partners on Norfolk Island or in Australia.
- The NIGC will recognise the continued heritage, culture and traditions of the island's culturally distinct people and preserve their enduring connections with, and to, their homeland; its important sites and surrounding sea.

NOTICE TO ALL NORFOLK ISLAND RESIDENTS

Norfolk Island Governance Committee – Community Representatives Election

Three (3) residents to be elected (non-compulsory election)

To be eligible to vote, you must enrol

Please note: Current enrolment on the Commonwealth Electoral Roll will NOT automatically enrol you for the Voter Roll for Norfolk Island Governance Committee Community Representatives Election. A Voter Roll and a special purpose Enrolment Form is being created for the Norfolk Island Governance Committee Community Representatives Election.

Eligibility to enrol

A person's eligibility to participate as a voter for the Norfolk Island Governance Committee Community Representatives Election shall be determined as at the day of polling on Wednesday, 11 October 2023.

A person is eligible to vote in the Norfolk Island Governance Committee Community Representatives Election if, on polling day, the person is:

- 1. 18 years of age or older; and
- has been normally resident on Norfolk Island for the 1-month period immediately preceding election day. This 1-month period does not include time off Norfolk Island for travel or accessing services in Australia or elsewhere.
- 3. Proof of residency and age status may be satisfied by the voter providing the following:
 - (a) photo identification with Norfolk Island residential address; or
 - (b) rates or utility notice with Norfolk Island residential address and
 - (i) photo identification that does not have a residential address, or
 - (ii) ATM card issued by a financial institution; or
 - (iii) Medicare card.
 - (c) a statutory declaration made by a person who can attest to the residential address, length of residency on Norfolk Island, and date of birth of the person who does not have the identification listed in (a) or (b).

Other Enrolment / Voting Matters

- Enrolment is for a physical address on Norfolk Island (you cannot claim residency for a Post Office Box).
- Attach a copy of your proof of age and proof of residency (your licence / rates notice / utility notice) with your enrolment application. This must match the enrolment address you are claiming.
- Ensure you indicate your preference as to how you would like to vote, either by Attendance Voting at a polling place or by Internet Voting. However, a current, valid, personal email address is required for those persons opting to vote using Internet Voting.

Introduction

Hello readers and welcome to another Norfolk News. This month, our focus is on some of the incredible scientific research that is conducted in the park! It's one of the primary motivations for first starting up this newsletter, as we personally find it fascinating and think many of you will too.

Norfolk Island boasts a truly unique biodiversity, and even in this modern day we are still unveiling new species and phenomena. Here, you will read about a newly discovered coral species, as well as how the use of technology has quantified rainfall through cloud water captured by the Norfolk Island Pine.

The national park also plays a crucial role in supporting new and upcoming researchers in their quests. This month, we feature a guest writer, Junn Foon, who is currently embarking on his PhD journey to answer critical questions about our endemic snails.

So sit back, enjoy the read, and we hope you learn something truly extraordinary!

Pines and palms play pivotal role in capturing cloud water!

The forests of Norfolk Island National Park, situated at elevations above 200 metres, are often shrouded in clouds. It has been suggested, based on scientific evidence and anecdotal observations, that these clouds may contribute water to the forest canopy in addition to rainfall, however, this phenomenon has never been measured before.

To bridge this knowledge gap a comprehensive study was conducted, measuring both *throughfall* (water reaching the forest floor directly through the canopy) and *stemflow* (water running down vegetation stems to the forest floor). The 524-day study yielded intriguing results: stemflow largely dominated the water delivery to the forest floor, accounting for a staggering 48% of total atmospheric inputs. This far surpassed observations from cloud-affected ecosystems elsewhere, which typically recorded less than 10% stemflow contribution.

It was discovered that this was primarily due to the funnelling characteristics of the dominant palm and pine trees. Both pines and palms have upwardly angled branches/ fronds which favour funnelling of water to the stem of individual trees.

Rainfall was rarely observed in the absence of low-level clouds. The cloud immersion events, at times spanning multiple days, ensured a continuous supply of water even in the absence of conventional rain. This cloud water interception amounted to approximately 20% of the total water input at both study sites, providing an extra 25% of water on top of the measured rainfall in open areas.

Though the additional hydrological input may be modest from an island-wide perspective,

it holds immense importance for local hydrological processes and the unique plant, insect, and animal species thriving in Norfolk Island's upland forests.

Norfolk Island school students name a new coral species!

A recent survey conducted by Dr. Andrew Baird from James Cook University has uncovered a new species of *Acropora* coral (a branching species), exclusively found in the Norfolk Marine Park.

With every new species discovery, a distinct scientific name must be assigned to set it apart from others in its genus. To fulfill this task, Parks Australia invited the school's environmental group to help come up with a unique name.

Led by their teacher, Caryn Harrington, the students came up with a range of creative options. Their imaginative ideas included names inspired by the coral's location, Tahitian words related to coral and the ocean, as well as their school name.



The new coral species was found just off-shore in the Norfolk Marine Park.

After careful consideration, the submissions were shortlisted, and the students voted on their favourite options, which were then presented to Dr. Andrew Baird and Parks Australia representatives.

For now, the final winning name will remain a secret until the new species is formally approved. So stay tuned for the exciting reveal, and in the meantime, keep your eyes open when you're exploring the waters around the island, because you never know what new wonders are available for discovery.

Studying the ecology and genetics of Norfolk Island's unique land snails

Junn Kitt Foon is a PhD candidate at Western Sydney University supervised by Dr. Kate Umbers and Dr. John Hunt of Western Sydney University, and Dr. Isabel Hyman and Dr. Frank Köhler of the Australian Museum.

Land snails, insects, worms and the many small creatures that live around us often escape our attention. Yet, they play essential roles in our environment like recycling nutrients in soils and as food for birds and other animals. Native land snails come in a remarkable variety of shapes and colours, with around 60 land snail species found only on Norfolk and Phillip Islands. Unfortunately, land snails are among the world's most threatened animals. In many Pacific islands, native land snails have become extinct due to predation by introduced species such as rats and flatworms, as well as habitat loss. Among the five largest species on Norfolk and Phillip islands, two have become extinct while three species are Critically Endangered, being reduced to a few tiny populations. Over the last three years, Dr. Isabel Hyman and Dr. Frank Köhler of the Australian Museum, in collaboration with the Norfolk Island National Park and NIRC have been reviewing the land

snail species on Norfolk and Phillip Islands. This provided a valuable baseline to initiate more in-depth studies to inform conservation plans.

To that end, I have begun a three-year PhD research journey (2023 to 2025) to investigate:

(1) How are the last few populations of these threatened species genetically connected to each other?

(2) What are the best habitats for native land snails on the islands?

(3) What predators eat these threatened species and how much impact do they have on these snails?

(4) How might climate change impact these snails? Answering these questions will help inform Norfolk and Phillip Island conservation plans to secure the long-term survival of these unique land snails.

Time to talk about plastics

First patented in 1907 by a Belgian chemist, plastic existed but was sparingly used until the 60's and 70's. As its popularity grew, it began to replace glass, metal, and ceramics as a cheap and convenient alternative for food storage, homewares, production, and so much more.

In the short 60 years that plastic has been the material of choice, it has colonised the world! From the world's highest and most remote mountaintops to the Mariana Trench, plastic has infiltrated ecosystems, soil, animals, and even humans!

The majority of plastics that we, as humans, use are single-use. The throw-away nature of this lifestyle has resulted in massive environmental damage.

The broad range of plastic types available to us, like PET, PVC, ABS, etc., can make it difficult to classify and often results in plastics being placed in the 'too hard' basket.

They wind up in landfills that pollute our local soil and waterways, or are exported to other countries where they do the same thing to someone else's environment.

There are many different options and innovations for recycling/repurposing plastic. From clothing and prosthetic limbs to pyrolysis and the creation of fuel, each innovation fills a niche and requires specific technology.

Revolve Your World considered multiple options for plastic recycling at the Norfolk Wave, eventually settling on the Resin8 concrete aggregate.

But why?

Unlike most other plastic recycling systems, Resin8 can process all plastic types from 1-7. We can process the commonly known recyclables like ice-cream containers, sauce bottles, etc., but we can also process soft plastics like glad wrap, chocolate wrappers, and plastic bags!

This broad brush approach means we can accept all of the community's plastic together (on the proviso that it's clean), and yorlyi don't have to worry about sorting into a million different plastic types. The other reason for choosing the Resin8 was that it would help to subsidise the demand for crushed rock aggregate. Norfolk is only so big, and constantly quarrying for rock is unsustainable.

We can't use the Resin8 aggregate in road base (due to its plastic makeup) but it's excellent for use in slabs, curbing, bricks, etc., where there is less wear and likelihood of microplastic contamination into the environment—using a problem to solve a problem!

But how do we make it?

When plastic arrives at the Norfolk Wave, it gets sent across the Recyclapod bench for sorting and cleaning (fingers crossed it's already clean). We then process the clean plastics through our granulator, where the plastic is chopped into 10mm pieces. We then feed the granulated plastic into two big metal hoppers.


Expressions of Interest opend for the Toon Trust Environmental Funding round 7 on Friday 18 August 2023.

Time to talk about plastics - continued

The plastic equipment consists of a granulator, five metal hoppers, a large paddle blender, an extruder, a water bath, a shredder, a conveyor, piping, and screw mechanisms. We have granulated plastic, hydrated lime, and carbon (from the carboniser we spoke about last week) inside the hoppers. An internal screw mechanism feeds each of these three components into the paddle blender. The paddle blender evenly mixes this combination before delivering it into a final hopper. The plastic/lime/carbon blend is then fed into the extruder, heated, and pushed out as a 25mm black sausage into a water bath. The reaction in the water bath expands the sausage and makes it porous. The sausages are left to cool and dry on a rack before being fed through the shredder and into a bulker bag for storage and later use.

Resin⁸ exceeds the ASTM standards for material performance and is the only material from plastic waste to improve the performance of structural concrete products.

It has been rigorously tested to demonstrate increased compression strength, flexibility, fire resistance, thermal resistance, and acoustic properties. 

Norfolk Island Governance Committee

This will be the first time in one hundred and sixtyseven years that the people of Norfolk Island will have a say in how we are to be governed. It is important! Let's not screw it up!

There could be any number of candidates that will stand who are competent and experienced, but we have to choose sullen who would not kowtow to pressure, like those who signed and agreed to the "Territories Law Reform Bill" or the "Road Map".

Just a couple of points (of the many) that the NIGC will have to consider:

There are approximately 3.5 people per square kilometer in Australia. In Norfolk Island we have a population density of 62.75 people per square kilometer. We must have immigration control.

This could be provided for under Sections 51(xxix) and 122 [of the Australian Constitution], with Australia's having responsibility for the Island's external affairs and defence"

The electoral roll opens on the 6th September. Make sure you enroll.

Childhood Cancer Awareness month is celebrated each year in September worldwide. Sadly, in Australia, around 750 to 800 children under the age of 15 are diagnosed with cancer every year and almost half of those diagnosed are aged 0-4 years. The good news is that survival rates for children with cancer in Australia continue to improve. The five year relative survival rate for all childhood cancers combined is 86%, up from 73% in the period 1983-1994. Most of the gains have occurred as a direct result of improvements in treatment through international collaborative clinical trials, of which Cancer Council is a part.

Bumboras Community Tree Planting

Our second community tree planting took place on Sunday, 20th August. Despite the torrential rain all through Saetdii night, Sunday morning was filled with sunshine. A small but committed crew of volunteers rallied together to revegetate the hillside at the top of Bumboras Reserve beside the driveway.

This area was recently cleared of African Olive and Hawaiian Holly. There was a nice amount of natural regeneration taking place in the form of young Pines, Flax, and White Oak, but we assisted in speeding up the process by adding 120 more Flax, Pine, Oak, and Abutilon as well.

We even found some Senecio sp. a rare, endangered endemic Yellow Daisy! We only found 3 specimens in the planting site but it was a beautiful reminder that

the hard work pays off in more way than one.

This area is an important area to protect. Its steepness, combined with the exposure to intense and constant winds, heightens its erosion risk. Our plantings in this area from last year have taken off, with the Flax flowering and the Coastal Coprosma producing its first seed.

The Pig Face will gradually spread and aid in stabilising the bank and providing a habitat for the next generation of seeds to germinate and take hold. This area is important for our migratory seabirds. Terns and Noddies nest in the pines, Tropic Birds on the banks, and Goesbad (Ghost Birds), and petrels in burrows in the cliffs. By stabilising the banks and creating shelter, we can extend the habitat for our precious seabirds. And they, in turn, will provide nutrients for better tree growth. It's a beautiful cycle. We may even see some Gaanet there one day.

As usual, thanks to our awesome volunteers for always showing up for Norfolk's environment, rain, hail, or shine!

Our next community tree planting will take place at Cockpit on Sunday 10th September.

Nosebleeds

The small blood vessels in the area between the nostrils are fragile and can burst easily causing a nosebleed. In children, the nose tends to bleed from only one side. Children usually grow out of the condition. If the bleeding is very heavy, prolonged or does not stop with first aid measures, take your child to NIHRACS.

Symptoms of nosebleeds

- bleeding from either or both nostrils
- a tingling feeling in the back of the throat **Causes of nosebleeds**

A nosebleed can be caused by a range of factors, including:

- fragile blood vessels that bleed easily, in warm dry air or after exercise
- an infection of the sinuses, allergies that causes hay fever or coughing
- bumps or falls, an object that has been pushed up the nostril like a finger

Treatment

Reassure the person, especially children, as crying increases blood flow.

- Sit the person up straight and drop their head slightly forward.
- Apply finger and thumb pressure on the soft part of nostrils below the bridge of the nose for at least 10 minutes.
- Tell them to breathe through their mouth while their nostrils are pinched.
- Loosen tight clothing around the neck.

CALLING AN AMBULANCE

When confronted by a sudden accident or illness and you want help. The quickest way to get help:

• Ring for the Ambulance, 22091 or 000



- Give the exact location, landmarks etc.
- Speak slowly and clearly.
- Give your name and the phone number you are ringing from.
- Give the number of casualities [if a multi person accident]
- Give the name of the patient if known [this is important on Norfolk as the hospital will have records of that person]

Telephone 22091 or 000

- State if any other emergency service is required eg. Police, Cliff rescue etc.
- Do NOT hang up till the hospital hangs up, they may have other questions they would like to ask.

- Place a cold cloth or cold pack over the person's forehead and one around the neck, especially around the sides of the neck.
- After 10 minutes, release the pressure on the nostrils and check to see if the bleeding has stopped.
- If bleeding persists, seek medical aid.
- Tell the person not to sniff or blow their nose for at least 15 minutes and not to pick their nose for the rest of the day.

Child Health Clinic

NIHRACS Child Health Clinic every Tuesday and Wednesday 8:30am to 4pm. This clinic is for 0 – 5 year olds and includes: Developmental Assessment, Baby Growth Checks, Emotional and Social Development, Breastfeeding Support, Settling/Sleep Support and Introducing solids.

The Child Health Clinic nurse is available for home visits for all new Mums and Dads until baby is 6 weeks old, (or longer where needed). This is great service and assists new parents and babies with the transition back to home.


