The telecast will be viewed at the Leagues Club, courtesy of the Australian Broadcasting Commission and the club's Acesatt telecommunication dish.

They also operated a Cash and Carry store and in the Norfolk Island News edition of Friday 16th September, 1949 we read that they were expecting "by the next airfreight - Nylon Stockings....Ladies Evening Shoes, Silver and Black and Evening Dress Lengths of Net and Taffeta".

Thelma has been bed-ridden for many years now and we understand that William is to take his mother to a Nursing Home in Wellington now that Harry has gone. It was Harry who was looking after in these latter years.
