We are here today to say a final goodbye to our Mum, Nana, Sister, Aunty and dear friend Ronda.

All that knew Mum were well aware that 'grey' did not exist – she was very much a black and white, spades a spade person but it is this trait that made most truly love her – her true essence. There was a little something special about her – even those that feared her were somehow drawn to her. It may have had something to do with her colourful vocabulary – she had a talent for turning a simple sentence into a masterpiece of colourful expressive language - no sentence was complete without 'FAARRK' being featured along the way.

We had a very fortunate childhood growing up on Norfolk Island in the beautiful home that Mum and Dad built together at Bumboras. All the neighbours new when dinner was ready, when Jim was being beckoned or when the kids were 'in the shit'. Brendon seemed to be a name often echoing across the valley – of course always in a loving kind and gentle manner – never with profanity.

Mum was quite the hostess and we have many memories getting up late to visit the bathroom, sneaking out into the dining room and peering through the window to find a cohort of topless woman frolicking in our swimming pool! As parents ourselves now, Mum has frequently lectured all of us on drinking around our children – pot calling kettle black!

Ronda established and owned the hairdressing Salon 'The Cut Above' – most of you will know the endearing 'nickname' that we dare not speak of right now (See You Next Tuesday) but there are certainly some fond and funny memories had upstairs in Foodlands.

Mum was renowned for her baking skills, many mouths salivate at the mere thought of her Chocolate

Eclairs, Jelly Cakes, Pavalova and Lamingtons. She had quite the sweet tooth our dear mum, Aunty Di sent over some Easter Bunnies for us one year and in true Ronda style she was a little peckish and decided at midnight to carefully unwrap the alfoil of one bunny and eat one ear and then carefully mould the foil back. Consequently, a week later, there were four children in tears as their bunnies had no ears! Dad was furious as he had to now deal with four mortified children.

In 1991, the family decided to move to NZ for a period. This seemed to be the start of a backwards and forwards journey as Mum always considered Norfolk Island her true home and her heart often drew her back here.

As you all know mum was medevac'd to Australia, Anzac day 2022. Mum's wish was to be able to return to Norfolk Island as a resident on the Randa however this was not possible due to her level of care needed. She dearly loved the staff at the Norfolk Island Hospital, not only were they her clinicians, they were her friends. The family would like to sincerely thank the staff for their unwavering and compassionate care provided to mum over numerous occasions.
