The first film was the story of Captain Cook's voyage of discovery to the South Seas in the ship "Endeavour" and for this, of course, the Bounty's name was changed to "Endeavour' and lo and behold, in some of the newspaper cuttings from Tahiti, there's young Michael, together with Keith Mitchell who plays the part of Captain Cook, sailing past an uninhabited part of Tahiti, proposing a Toast to the discovery of Norfolk Island on 10th October, 1774!

A quick change of name and the Bounty then became the "Blossom" for the French television series on what happened on Pitcairn after the

mutineers had settled there.

In another French paper there's another picture of our roving Norfolk Islander, together with two charming Tahitian looking ladies on board the "Blossom" (Bounty). Michael's English translation is, "having a good time" - the caption under the photograph reads in French "A droite Michael Evans descendent du mutin F.M.Evans".

Life at sea must have been very hard! - Hard to concentrate on sailing the ship as from some of the pictures in the French newspapers, it would appear that there were quite a few topless Tahitian ladies as

part of the 'props'.

The reason for Michael sending these two most interesting and colourful scrap books to us was in case anyone else on Norfolk Island would like to join the Bounty as a "guest crew member" on some of its forthcoming voyages of adventure.

The cost of Michael's 3 months on the Bounty amounted to Aust. \$1,920 of which he was reimbursed by being an "extra" during the filming of

the two television series.
